RESOLUTION 22-134

APPROVING CLOSE OUT CHANGE ORDER AND DECLARING ACCEPTANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS TO BARBERIE AVENUE

WHEREAS, by way of Resolution 22-049 duly adopted on January 19, 2022 Compass Construction was awarded a contract associated with drainage improvements to Barberie Avenue; and

WHEREAS, the contract awarded to Compass Construction was in the amount of \$35,275.00; and

WHEREAS, the Project Engineer, CME Associates, has advised that the project is complete at this time. The change order reflects increases and decreases in original contract quantities required to complete the project; and

WHEREAS, CME Associates has advised that the Closeout Change Order results in a decrease in the project cost from the original amount of \$35,275.00 to an adjusted total of \$34,400.00, for a decrease of \$875.00, as specifically set forth in their correspondence dated May 23, 2022; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of the aforesaid contract, Compass Construction has submitted a two (2) year Maintenance Bond in the amount of \$5,160.00, which represents fifteen (15) percent of the final Contract Amount; and

WHEREAS, the Project Engineer, CME Associates, has recommended authorizing the aforesaid Change Order, releasing the Performance Bond and accepting the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Governing Body of the Borough of Highlands, that based on the above recommendations from the Project Engineer, CME Associates, that the Closeout Change Order changing the original contract amount to \$34,400.00, for a decrease of \$875.00, be and is hereby approved.

RESOLUTION 22-136 IN SUPPORT OF CANNABIS ESTABLISHMENT

WHEREAS, on January 18, 2010, Governor Jon Corzine signed the New Jersey Compassionate Use Medical Marijuana Act, N.J.S.A. 24:61-1 et seq., which provided for the legalization of medical marijuana and creation of a program to allow persons suffering from qualifying debilitating medical conditions to obtain medical marijuana in a safe, timely and compassionate manner; and

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey in 2018 amended its regulatory scheme so as to expand the scope of citizens to whom medical marijuana may be prescribed and so as to make medical marijuana more accessible and available to many of the citizens who need it; and

WHEREAS, on November 3, 2020, the Marijuana Legalization Amendment was approved by voters in New Jersey, which legalized the possession and use of cannabis for residents twenty-one years of age or older;

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2021, Governor Phil Murphy signed into law the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory, Enforcement Assistance, and Marketplace Act, which established the adult use cannabis program in the State of New Jersey.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands endorses the adult use cannabis program in the State of New Jersey, as well as the medical use program, which provides needed relief to the many persons suffering from chronic and/or debilitating illnesses who may benefit from this program; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands supports the safe and appropriate siting of an adult-use cannabis dispensary within the Central Business District zone(s) of the Borough of Highlands to the extent consistent with applicable state and local statutes, rules, regulations, and ordinances, including but not limited to the cannabis retailer licensing provisions of Borough Code Section 4-18 and the conditional use zoning requirements of Section 21-97(M); and

WHEREAS, Bridge City Collective Highlands LLC has expressed interest in the siting of such a facility within the Borough of Highlands.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Borough Council supports the safe and appropriate siting of an adult-use cannabis dispensary within the Central Business District zone(s) of the Borough of Highlands by Bridge City Collective Highlands LLC to the extent consistent with applicable state and local statutes, rules, regulations and ordinances, including but not limited to the cannabis retailer licensing provisions of Borough Code Section 4-18 and the conditional use zoning requirements of Section 21-97(M).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that due to the Borough's limit of a single Cannabis Retailer License, upon submission of a complete license application, the license applicant that receives Cannabis Regulatory Commission approval first in time shall be deemed approved by the Borough.

Mayor Broullon noted that there were edits to review. Mr. Ball gave overview of the resolution and the edits for consideration – change of title and addition of last paragraph. He also noted that the Governing Body is not approving the license and that any applicant will have to go to State for approval.

Council President Olszewski asked if doing this closes the door to other interested parties. Mayor Broullon answered that there were 6 interested parties but this is the only one to come this far. Councilmember Chelak noted that the applicant is a medical dispensary for many years. Mayor Broullon added that they currently operate in 4 states. Councilmember Cervantes asked if the process is the liquor license process. Mayor Broullon answered that this is just a letter of support and there will only be 1 business in Highlands. Councilmember Melnyk added that this is an important vetting process.

RESOLUTION 22-137 AUTHORIZING PLEDGE OF MUNICIPAL SUPPORT FOR NEW JERSEY'S WILDLIFE ACTION PLAN

WHEREAS, New Jersey is home to a rich diversity of wildlife and ecologically significant natural communities,

WHEREAS, New Jersey's wildlife and wild places are under threat from development, fragmentation, invasive species and the impacts of people,

WHEREAS, the populations of mammals, birds, invertebrates, fish, reptiles and amphibians that live in and migrate through New Jersey find themselves clinging to smaller and smaller pieces of wild clean lands and aquatic habitats,

WHEREAS, it is more cost—effective to prevent species from becoming imperiled than it is to recover them once their populations have declined,

WHEREAS, a naturally functioning and healthy ecosystem represents a healthy environment for NJ wildlife and our citizens,

WHEREAS, the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife, other state and federal agencies, and many partners in conservation have worked together to develop a state Wildlife Action Plan for the benefit of biologists, wildlife experts, municipal leaders, land stewards, non—profit organizations, educators, planners, researchers, outdoor recreation enthusiasts, landowners and all the people who know the wild places of New Jersey State,

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Wildlife Action plan is a comprehensive action agenda for the conservation of native wildlife, the restoration of important lands and water, and public education targeting the needs of rare wildlife in New Jersey,

WHEREAS, the residents of, and visitors to, New Jersey also enjoy and benefit from New Jersey's wildlife and wild spaces.

NOW THEREFORE, we, the Borough of Highlands, resolve to take the following steps with regard to our municipal land—use decisions with the intent of making the Borough of Highlands an ecologically sustainable community. It is our intent to include these principles in our public lands management, our environmental resources inventory and to inform the next master plan revision and update our zoning accordingly.

We will identify imperiled species, critical habitat and unique ecosystems in our Environmental Resource Inventory.

Acknowledging that it is more cost—effective to protect species than recover species, we will protect populations of rare and imperiled species that live and breed in, and migrate through, the municipality and the habitats they depend upon.

Because habitat integrity is critical to healthy biodiversity we will manage publicly owned lands in accordance with wildlife management actions laid out in the New Jersey Wildlife Action Plan and will promote the management of all protected lands to promote biodiversity.

We will protect wildlife habitats and maintain connectivity of habitat when formulating an open space acquisition strategy, open space stewardship plans and through the municipal master plan including planning and zoning ordinances.

We will seek to minimize disturbance of critical wildlife populations and their habitats from human activities, subsidized predators and invasive species.

When possible and appropriate, we will work with neighboring municipalities to implement the principles across municipal boundaries.

When possible and appropriate, we will strive to monitor and implement appropriate management of municipal easements to ensure native vegetation and wildlife takes precedence over invasive and/or exotic species.

RESOLUTION 22-138 MUNICIPAL SUPPORT FOR RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP PROGRAMS IN THE COMMUNITY

RECOGNIZING that cats and dogs are an integral and valuable part of all communities, and contribute to the well-being of humans, whether as companions, service animals, or therapy pets, and

UNDERSTANDING that municipalities have an important role in ensuring the well-being of animals while balancing the needs of pet owners and non-pet owners.

WHEREAS, legislators and municipal officials report that the number of calls from citizens about animal related issues rival any other issue(s);

WHEREAS, there are approximately 2.2 million owned dogs and 2.5 million owned cats in New Jersey;

WHEREAS, New Jersey was the first state in the nation to develop an innovative state-wide spay/neuter program and all proceeds from the sale of Animal Friendly License Plates are used to reimburse participating veterinarians for spaying and neutering surgeries;

WHEREAS, State responsibility for promoting responsible pet care and ensuring that pets do not suffer due to abuse, neglect, or lack of proper care in kennels, pet shops, shelters, and pounds (animal facilities) is vested in the Office of Animal Welfare within the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services;

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Society to Prevent Cruelty to Animals (NJSPCA) and municipal Animal Cruelty Investigators (ACIs) are responsible for investigating and acting as officers for the detection, apprehension, and arrest of offenders against the animal cruelty laws;

WHEREAS, New Jersey mandates training requirements for animal control officers and Animal Cruelty Investigators;

WHEREAS, New Jersey impounds over 100,000 animals per year in animal shelters and impoundment facilities;

WHEREAS, approximately 37% of the animals that enter New Jersey's impoundment facilities are euthanized, at a rate of around 3000 every month;

WHEREAS, free-roaming unvaccinated cats and dogs present a potential health threat to humans through the spread of such zoonotic diseases as rabies, leptospirosis, toxoplasmosis, roundworms, animal bites, and environmental contamination from animal feces;

WHEREAS, stray and unwanted pets place an enormous financial burden on municipalities and non-profit humane agencies organized to care for these animals;

WHEREAS, it is more humane and cost-effective to reduce the number of unwanted animals than it is to impound and euthanize unwanted or unclaimed dogs and cats;

WHEREAS, all dogs are required to be licensed in the municipality where they are housed and the majority of municipalities also require licensure of cats;

WHEREAS, all municipalities are required to canvass their residents to locate unlicensed dogs;

NOW THEREFORE, we the municipality of the Borough of Highlands resolve to take the following steps with regard to our municipal responsibilities with the intent of making the Borough of Highlands a truly sustainable community.

It is our intent to do our utmost, within the bounds of our jurisdiction, to ensure that companion animals are treated humanely, respectfully, and responsibly through public education and through exercise of powers vested within New Jersey municipalities as follows:

The Municipality pledges to:

- Enforce all animal and rabies control statutes and regulations, including the requirement to
 pick up and impound all stray dogs and cats, excepting stray and feral cats in managed TNR
 programs.
- Work to improve the enforcement of animal cruelty statutes.
- Educate our community, including school children, about their responsibilities towards the pet animals they chose to keep.
- Institute, as appropriate, cat licensing ordinances and increase the percentage of licensed dogs and cats through ease of licensing and licensing enforcement measures.
- Identify and work to implement best practices to prevent unwanted breeding through
 effective animal control, availability of low-cost pet spaying and neutering services, public
 education, and pet-friendly rental and senior housing.
- Identify alternatives to euthanasia of adoptable companion animals, including utilizing foster homes, adoption networks and providing remedial behavior training services to existing and future owners.
- Assist in identifying resources to improve the conditions and increase the capacity of animal shelters and impoundment facilities and animal control services.

RESOLUTION 22-142 Urging the Swift Passage of S-330 Which Restores Energy Tax Receipts

WHEREAS, taxes on gas and electric utilities were originally collected by the host municipalities to be used for local purposes and to compensate the public for the use of their rights of way; and

WHEREAS, when the State made itself the collection agent for these taxes, it promised to dedicate the proceeds to municipal property tax relief; since, just as municipalities collect property taxes for the benefit of school districts, counties, and other entities, the State is supposed to collect Energy Taxes for the benefit of municipal governments; and

WHEREAS, for years, though, State budget makers have diverted funding from Energy Taxes to fund State programs; and instead of being spent on local programs and services and used to offset property taxes, the money has been spent as successive Legislatures and Administrations have seen fit; and

WHEREAS, the diversion of dedicated energy tax receipts to the State's General Fund further jeopardizes this critical property tax relief funding in future years; and

WHEREAS, by reducing Consolidated Municipal Property Tax Relief Act (CMPTRA), which is also comprised of revenues that should be returned to municipalities, State Budget makers have been

able to continue collecting Energy Taxes, while keeping additional revenue that should have been returned to provide property tax relief; and

WHEREAS, the cumulative impact of years of underfunding has left many municipalities with serious needs and burdensome property taxes; and

WHEREAS, local elected officials are in the best position to decide the best use of these resources, which were always intended to fund local programs and services; and

RESOLUTION 22-143

AUTHORIZING CONTRACT FOR CONSULTING SERVICES TO ASSIST THE BOROUGH OF HIGHLANDS POLICE DEPARTMENT WITH DEVELOPING A CUSTOMIZED POLICY MANUAL, ACCREDITATION AND AN ONLINE IN-SERVICE TRAINING MODULE PROGRAM

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.4 et seq. (New Jersey Local Unit Pay-To-Play Laws), the Borough must award by resolution all goods and services contracts with a dollar amount between \$17,500 and \$43,999. These contracts are not bid, but vendors are still responsible to provide political contribution and company disclosure information in order to do business with the Borough; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of $\underline{\text{N.J.S.A.}}$ 19:44A-20.4 et seq., when the cost of goods and/or services falls between \$17,500 and the bid threshold of \$44,000 in the aggregate, an approval by resolution must be in place; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands Police Department has determined there is a need for services to develop a customized policy manual and for an online, in-service training module program; and

WHEREAS, The Rodgers Group, LLC (hereafter The Rodgers Group) is the only firm that provides such services, therefore, the solicitation of quotations for such services is impracticable and additionally such services constitute extraordinary, unspecifiable services pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:11-5(1)(a)(ii); and

WHEREAS, The Rodgers Group provided a quotation in the amount of \$29,900.00 to update and rewrite the Police Department written directive system including SOP's General Orders and Rules and Regulations to make them compliant with all laws, Attorney General Guidelines and the standards required for NJSACOP Accreditation, and a quotation of \$2,937.60 to provide an online in-service training module program for a total of \$32,837.60; and

WHEREAS, the Borough desires to retain the services of The Rodgers Group for a contract term not to exceed two (2) for the above-noted consulting services; and

WHEREAS, The Rodgers Group completed and submitted a Business Entity Disclosure Certification which certifies the business entity has not made any reportable contributions to a political or candidate committee in the Borough in the previous one year, and that the contract will prohibit The Rodgers Group from making any reportable contributions through the term of the contract.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough of Highlands as follows:

- 1. The Rodgers Group is hereby retained to provide the above-noted consulting services in a total amount not to exceed \$32,837.60 in accordance with the terms of a contract or contracts to be entered into between the Borough and The Rodgers Group.
- 2. The Mayor and Borough Clerk are hereby authorized to sign a contract or contracts with The Rodgers Group in accordance with this Resolution.

<u>Mayor's Report</u>: Mayor Broullon gave construction updates on the North Street pump upgrades, Snug Harbor Park Improvements, Skate Park, Barberie Ave. drainage, Marine Place wall, Matthew and King Streets, South Bay and Hillside Aves., Phase I Sanitary Sewer Improvements, Municipal Building, and the Waterwitch Pump Station.

She also gave updates on upcoming projects – Marine Place elevated walkway, Ederle Park, Veterans Park, Overlook Park, Frank Hall Park, Charging Station, and South Bay and Hillside Aves. Drainage.

Mayor Broullon gave updates on Redevelopment projects – Captain's Cove, Shadow Lawn, and Central Business District.

She then updated on grants awarded and submitted, upcoming events, and the new dog park at Popamora Point.

<u>Administrator's Report</u>: Mr. Muscillo reported recent anti-harassment training for staff. Mayor Broullon pretty much covered construction updates.

<u>Engineer's Report</u>: Mr. Matlack gave updates on: Phase I Sanitary Sewer, Ederle Park, South Bay and Hillside Aves. Drainage improvement, Marine Place Walkway. He's also working on getting FEMA's CRS determination for Highlands to be eligible for lower flood insurance rate. It's a long process. Mayor Broullon added that she's heard from residents who were available to volunteer if needed.

With no one on the dais having anything else to add, Mayor Broullon opened Public Portion.

PUBLIC PORTION:

Barbara Domings, 247 Bay Ave., asked if the Phase I project include Atlantic Street. Mayor Broullon answered that residents will be notified as the project progresses. Ms. Domings asked if the dog park will have a small dog section. Mayor Broullon answer that she thinks so but will follow up. Ms. Domings asked for clarification of the Trust on the Payment of Bills. Mr. Muscillo answered that it is monies received for specific items/projects. Mayor Broullon answered that it was storm recovery funds that were received.

Tina Kemmer, 164 Linden, asked for the update on the Slope Ordinance. Mayor Broullon answered that the public hearing will be at the next Council meeting. Ms. Kemmer asked about the sanitation budget and if it included consideration for recycling. Mr. Muscillo answered that he's still working on it. We recently extended contract for 1 year and that additional recycling services could cost about \$50,000 per month. Ms. Kemmer asked if the cannabis business was medicinal or recreational and its proposed location. Councilmember Melnyk answered that it was recreational and that it's in the designated zone. Mr. Ball answered that we waiting for the application. Ms. Kemmer referenced Red Bank's cannabis ordinance. Mayor Broullon answered that Highlands pass its own extensive ordinance last year. Ms. Kemmer thought the Companion Animal Resolution was a good start but it does not address the town's feral animal problems. She asked if the Highlands Police Department have plans in place to address fireworks. Chief Burton, who was in the audience, said that he could discuss it further with her after the meeting.

Joe Dorin, 102 Valley, reported his ongoing problems with the neighboring project at 14 North Peak St.

With no further comments, Mayor Broullon closed Public Portion.
