PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED ORDINANCES

ORDINANCE 0-23-19

AMENDING BOROUGH OF HIGHLANDS REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES CHAPTER 2 (ADMINISTRATION) SECTION 7 (ADMINISTRATIVE ORGANIZATION AND PERSONNEL POLICIES) SUBSECTION 7.6 (PUBLIC CONTRACTING REFORM)

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey enacted the Elections Transparency Act, P.L. 2023, c. 30, which made significant changes to New Jersey's local pay-to-play laws; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Local Finance Board has recommended that municipalities repeal ordinances authorized by N.J.S.A. 40A:11-51; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands currently has a local pay-to-play law in Chapter 2, Section 7, Subsection 7.6 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Highlands which is authorized by N.J.S.A. 40A:11-51; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the changes to the law brought forth by P.L. 2023, c. 30, it is in the best interest of the Borough of Highlands to amend its current pay-to-play law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Highlands, the County of Monmouth, in the State of New Jersey, that Chapter 2, Section 7, Subsection 7.6 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Highlands be repealed in its entirely and replaced as follows:

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§ 2-7.6 [Reserved]

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All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

<u>IV</u>

If any section, subparagraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall be held to be invalid, such decision shall not invalidate the remaining portion of this Ordinance.

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This Ordinance shall take effect upon adoption and publication according to law.

ORDINANCE 0-23-20

AMENDING CHAPTER 21 (ZONING AND LAND USE REGULATIONS), PART VI (FEE SCHEDULE), ARTICLE XXIII (FEES), SECTION 21-107 (SCHEDULE ESTABLISHED)

WHEREAS, Chapter 21 (Zoning and Land Use Regulations), Part VI (Fee Schedule), Article XXIII (Fees), Section 21-107 (Schedule Established) sets forth fees for the various applications for developments and other matters; and

WHEREAS, the governing body desires to amend the fees schedule.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands as follows:

SECTION I.

Borough Code Chapter 21 (Zoning and Land Use Regulations), Part VI (Fee Schedule), Article XXIII (Fees), Section 21-107 (Schedule Established) shall be amended as follows: (additions are shown in <u>underlines</u>, deletions are shown as <u>strikeovers</u>.)

The following Schedule of Fees is established for the various applications for development and other matters, which are the subject of this chapter. These fees shall be nonrefundable and are for the purpose of offsetting Borough administrative, clerical and meeting costs. Applications requiring a combination of approvals, such as subdivision, site plan and/or variances shall require a fee equal to the sum of the individual fees for each element of the application. Escrow deposits for professional consultants, such as legal, planning, engineering, or other professional fees, costs and expenses, shall also be required in accordance with § 21-108.

All fees and escrow deposits required in §§ 21-107 and 21-108 shall be paid prior to the certification of a complete application.

SECTION IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and publication in accordance with law.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Highlands is committed to addressing climate change and reducing greenhouse gas emissions for current and future generations; and

Construct new municipal buildings as model green buildings; and

WHEREAS, the Community Energy Plan is consistent with the Borough's 2016 Master Plan Reexamination Report and Amendments, wherein sustainable development and resiliency is recommended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands that it hereby adopts the Community Energy Plan prepared by Colliers Engineering & Design dated June 23, 2023 demonstrating the Borough's commitment to a sustainable future.

AWARDING LEASE OF MUNICIPAL PROPERTY DESIGNATED AS BLOCK 56, LOT 13 ON THE TAX MAP OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHLANDS

WHEREAS, the Borough owns property designated as Block 56, Lot 13 on the Tax Map of the Borough of Highlands; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:12-14 sets forth, in relevant part, that a municipality may lease any real property not needed for public use; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:12-14(a) sets forth, in relevant part, that in the case of a lease to a private person, said lease shall be made to the highest bidder by open public bidding at auction or by the submission of sealed bids; and

WHEREAS, by way of Resolution 18-118, duly adopted on May 16, 2018, the Borough authorized a lease with The Proving Ground for Block 56, Lot 13 and said lease shall expire on October 31, 2023; and

WHEREAS, by way of Resolution 23-173, duly adopted August 16, 2023, the Borough authorized advertisement for and the solicitation of sealed bids for the lease of the property designed as Block 56, Lot 13 on the Tax Map of the Borough of Highlands on a non-exclusive basis for the purpose of operating a parking lot; and

WHEREAS, on September 13, 2023, the Borough of Highlands accepted bids for the lease of Block 56, Lot 13 for an initial term of one (1) year with the option to continue the lease for up to four (4) consecutive additional one (1) year terms at the option of the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Borough received one (1) response from SmokeNMirrors LLC dba The Proving Ground for the lease of Block 56, Lot 13 in the amount of \$2,000 per month for a total of \$24,000 per year for years 1 through 5; and

WHEREAS, the Borough wishes to accept the proposal, which exceeded the minimum bid requirements contained in the public notice to bidders, and award a lease to SmokeNMirrors LLC dba The Proving Ground.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands, that the Borough hereby accepts the proposal dated September 11, 2023 from SmokeNMirrors LLC dba The Proving Ground, for the lease of Borough owned property located at Block 56, Lot 13 on the Tax Map of the Borough of Highlands on a non-exclusive basis for the purpose of operating a parking lot for an amount of \$2,000.00 per month for a total of \$24,000.00 per year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the governing body of the Borough of Highlands, that the Borough Attorney be and is hereby directed to prepare a Lease Agreement in accordance with the aforesaid terms, wherein the said lease will be for an initial term of one (1) year with the option to continue the said lease for up to four (4) consecutive additional one (1) year terms at the option of the Borough.

RESOLUTION 23-196 AUTHORIZING MEMBERSHIP IN THE NEW JERSEY ASSOCIATION OF FLOODPLAIN MANAGERS FOR HIGHLANDS BOROUGH

WHEREAS, Highlands Borough has undertaken a FEMA National Flood Insurance Program CRS Community Rating System initiative to provide credits and credit criteria of the CRS Community activities and programs that go above and beyond the minimum requirement for participation in FEMA's National Flood Insurance Program NFIP; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Association of Floodplain Managers, NJAFM, provides training and certification as a Floodplain Manager and Highlands Borough has identified a CRS Team to implement flood mitigation activities; and

WHEREAS, training and certifications will reduce and avoid flood damage to insurable property; strengthen and support the insurance aspects of the National Flood Insurance Program NFIP and foster comprehensive floodplain management; and

WHEREAS, Annual Membership in the New Jersey Association of Floodplain Mangers, NJAFM, will facilitate training and educational sessions at an annual conference and with online testing for certifications; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that membership in the New Jersey Association of Floodplain Managers, NJAFM, is required to meet the goals of the FEMA Community Rating System CRS and the National Flood Insurance Program NFIP; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that two members of the Highlands Administration – Kevin Rooney and Spencer Carpenter are authorized to become members of the New Jersey Association of Floodplain Managers NJAFM and to utilize all training, networking and certification activities in concert with the Association of State Floodplain Managers which has established a national program for certifying floodplain managers. This program recognizes continuing education and professional development that enhances the knowledge and performance of local state, federal and private-sector floodplain management professionals.
